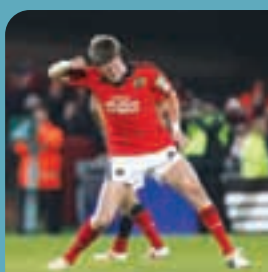
Our Mission

The Federation of Irish Sport (the "Federation") was established by the National Governing Bodies of Sport ("NGBs") in 2002 to act as representative body for all sporting organisations and to provide an independent voice for sport.

Membership is open to NGBs as well as sporting organisations whose primary purpose is the promotion of sport and/or physical recreation on a non-commercial basis. The membership is currently comprised of in excess of 70 NGBs and 30 Local Sports Partnerships.

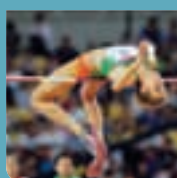
The Federation is committed to:-

- Representing the interests of the sporting community to government;
- Raising political awareness as to the benefit of sport as a force for good in society;
- Influencing the development of effective sports policy;
- Building the capacity of member organisations.



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Delivering a strong return on investment

In 2011 the Government invested €46.87 million in Irish sport. So what did the taxpayer get for their investment?

- Irish sportsmen and sportswomen competed with distinction in 70 different countries around the world.
- 30 different sports hosted international events in Ireland.
- 280 million homes in 140 countries watched the Solheim Cup while a further 200 million in 100 countries watched the UEFA Europa League Final in the Aviva Stadium.
- Sports tourism generated in excess of €800 million.
- 1.4 million people tuned into the All Ireland Football Final.
- RTE TV dedicated 1,000 hours to sport in 2011 while the Irish Times carried over 2,000 pages of coverage of sport during the year.
- Ireland's cricket team made us all proud beating England at the World Cup in India, chasing down the biggest total in a World Cup ever to do so.
- Ireland's elite sportsmen and sportswomen won 56 medals at European or World Championship level over the past 12 months.
- Ireland's soccer team qualified for next year's Euro Championships. In 2008 the finals of the Euro Championships were watched by hundreds of millions of people worldwide with audience share regularly topping 70% in participating countries.
- Rory McIlroy and Darren Clarke won two of the season's four golf majors and in the process ensured that Ireland as a golf destination would be top of mind for golfers worldwide.
- 84% of the available TV audience tuned into Ireland's match against Australia in the Rugby World Cup whilst it was the most watched TV subscription programme in Australian TV history.
- Almost 40% of the population (1.7 million) participated in sport on a regular basis with a further 270,000 volunteers ensuring that Irish sport happened on a weekly basis.
- Sport stimulated €1.8 billion of household expenditure – and supports in excess 38,000 jobs.

And that is only a small cross section of what sport delivered. Irish sport matters. In fact it has never mattered more!

Sport can be a catalyst for a better future

Two years ago Irish Sport appealed to the government to recognise the importance of sport and what it does for our country.

The appeal, which was on behalf of all in Irish sport, focused on protecting the funding for Irish sport and also the importance of giving sport a voice at the cabinet table. It was an appeal that was made again last year.

Funding to sport has been significantly reduced, falling from a peak of €311 million in 2008 to €86.4 million for 2011. The Sports Capital Programme has been suspended for 3 years and the construction of sporting facilities at the National Sports Campus has yet to commence. But more than that there has been a failure to engage with sport, to grasp sports potential as a force for good in our society not to mention a lack of acknowledgment of sports true impact away from the field of play.

A depressing scenario and one which was confirmed to us when sport, despite our request, was not deemed of sufficient worth to be included at the recent Global Economic Summit in Dublin Castle. We cannot change the past but like all committed sportspeople we would like to be involved in shaping the future and we believe sport can do

just that – help shape the future of our country.

We fully understand that these are difficult times for our country and that difficult decisions have to be taken. We are not asking to be treated differently. We are, however, asking that the powers that be listen to what we have to say for we truly believe that sport can have a major role to play as we look for ways out of our current plight.

Irish Sport strongly believes that sport can do a great deal more. We believe Irish sport can play a key role – in many different ways – as we face into the huge task of re-building confidence in Ireland and the Irish economy.

The Government has outlined some priorities in relation to sport. It would be our contention that these are in no way ambitious enough and they do not recognise the contribution sport can and indeed should play in the future of the country.

The Federation strongly believes that the Minister's priority should be to enable sport to deliver on its full potential for Ireland across a whole series of different headings. These include:-

- The improvement of public health
- The promotion of sports tourism

- The re-building of communities
- The creation of a more positive image for Ireland both domestically and internationally

Our vision is an Ireland in which sport is allowed realise its full potential. We believe the Government should support that view, embrace it and help us achieve it.

As we have said in recent years our goal has been to protect current funding for Irish sport and to ensure that sport continues to have a voice at the Cabinet table.

We now believe that our own ambitions are also too limited. Yes, of course, we need continued Government funding but then that is a good investment. Government investment is the seed capital that currently delivers a return of €149 for every €100 received.

Irish sport realises that the Government continues to have to make difficult decisions in relation to funding. Sport has already taken massive hits and we would contend that any further curtailment in the investment is going to damage sport – and its potential hugely.

Irish Sport strongly believes it has a real role to play in...

...creating a positive image for Ireland

56 medals won by Irish athletes in international competition around the world in 2011.

We believe that as a priority the Government should bring together all of the key players in Irish sport with a view to developing a master plan for the next five years. Once agreed nothing should be done outside that master plan. It is about creating a vision for what sport in Ireland.

Sport knows best as to what it needs if it is to deliver on its potential. At the same time we readily acknowledge that if the Government is to continue funding it that guarantees are needed as to what the return might be.

In order to enable sport to deliver its full potential we believe that the Government needs to look seriously at a whole range of different objectives.

We understand that it is the government's intention to reintroduce a €30 million sports capital programme in 2012. It is vital that this money is allocated strategically in line with the needs and resources of the sports community to ensure that maximum value is derived from new and improved sporting facilities. We believe that in these times of limited resources that the Government must consult with the individual sports bodies regarding the proposed distribution of these monies. In this way the investment will be made where they can and will most benefit the further development of the sports. Sport is best positioned to assist government in ensuring the maximisation of the return on any such capital investment.

By including some of these in future plans it should be possible eventually to re-look at how sport is currently funded.

Among the areas that should be explored in any future plans for sport should be:

- National Governing Bodies must be asked to seriously input into the decision making process regarding the new round of the Sports Capital Programme to ensure maximum benefit to Irish Sport from any additional or improved facilities
- A commitment to review the current disbursement of National Lottery proceeds with a view to ring fencing a given annual percentage for sport.
- A plan to incentivise the private sector with a view to getting them to invest in sport. This must include a review of the exclusion of amateur sport from the definition of charitable purpose in the Charities Act 2009.
- The cultivation of philanthropy in sport.
- The linking of public health goals to sports participation ensuring that participation rates are measured annually to facilitate performance analysis. This should be underpinned by the development of a National Physical Activity Strategy which would include specified sports participation levels among both children and adults.

- The development of the National Sports Campus.
- The ensuring of accessibility of schools sports facilities to community based sports groups such as clubs.
- Increased involvement with the EU in relation to sport including facilitating access by Irish organisations to EU sports funding, ensuring Irish representatives at all EU meetings on sport and the hosting of the EU Sports Forum during the presidency of the EU.
- Development of a national sports inclusion policy with particular emphasis on people with disability.
- In conjunction with the Tourism Section of the Department expanding the sports tourism initiative including the development of a specific sports bidding entity (such as Sport Denmark which is now successful in two of every three bids it makes).
- The creation of a national sports intern scheme together with a sports qualification programme which would facilitate the obtaining of sports funding qualifications by the unemployed.

While looking into all of the above Government must prioritise current funding to sport as distributed through the Irish Sports Council. To cut the funding further would have disastrous effects for Irish sport and minimise sport's ability to deliver consistent returns for Ireland.

Restoring Confidence in Ourselves and the Economy

Over the past two years the Federation has created an end of year document for submission to the Government. In the document we looked at how sport had performed over the past 12 months and in essence sought to demonstrate the value the government, and ultimately the taxpayer gets for the relatively small investment that the state makes annually in Irish sport.

Given the current economic climate we feel that such a report, or annual report, as we like to think of it, is ever more essential. We do realise that funding in all areas is under pressure and that sport can not be an exception. We fully accept that.

At the same time we are very much of the opinion – and this is the opinion shared right across the Irish sporting community – that sport even in its current form provides terrific value for a state investment of less than €87 million annually.

It is an investment that is essential to the future well-being of Irish sport as it is the funding that initially provides the programmes that lead to sport unearthing new talents; talents that are then nurtured by the funding to create the high performance sportsmen and sportswomen that do our country proud year in year out.

It is an accepted fact throughout the sporting world that if we stop funding developmental programmes, even for a few years, that the effects will not be seen immediately but will be there for all to see in eight to ten years down the road.

I believe it is fair to say that if the Golfing Union of Ireland for instance were not in a position to fund their development programmes that we would not be experiencing the highs of recent years. When we have all been proud of the exploits of Padraig Harrington, Graeme McDowell, Rory McIlroy and Darren Clarke – all of whom have been quick to acknowledge the importance of the GUI in their early career path.

The same story is seen throughout Irish sport. As you will see in this report the last twelve months have seen Irish sportsmen and sportswomen compete at the highest level all over the world and in doing so have raised all our spirits in these depressing times.

Who can forget the Irish cricket team beating England at the World Cup in India; Leinster winning the Heineken Cup; Munster the Magners League; Conor Niland putting Irish tennis on the world stage in Wimbledon and Flushing Meadow; our rugby team beating Australia in the World Cup in New Zealand; Rory McIlroy and Darren Clarke with their Open wins in the US and the UK, the Irish amateurs at the Walker Cup in Scotland; Ireland's soccer team perform heroically all over Europe; the boxers in Baku, or indeed, the emerging talent of Ireland's up and coming world class athletes including the Maguire Twins at the Junior Solheim Cup, Annalise Murphy continuing to take the sailing world by storm not to mention success on the track and in the pool at the European Youth Olympic Games in Turkey.

They all made us proud of being Irish and in the case of the diaspora provided a timely reminder of all the good things about Ireland.

And their exploits are of course only one apart of the Irish sporting story. It was also a year in which Ireland welcomed both the Solheim Cup and the UEFA Europa League Final – events which while not having Irish participants in them, beamed images of Ireland to countries all over the world, never mind attracting many visitors to our shores.

Sports tourism is the fastest growing niche in the global tourist industry and with a little more support could be a major factor in our economic recovery. We have the products – golfers worldwide want to play links golf and Ireland has some 30% of all the links courses in the world.

And the story does not end there. Sport should be for everyone and the more the government invests in general recreational sports programmes the better the health of the nation. In the UK it is estimated that physical inactivity costs up to 11% of the health budget. At a time when the experts are saying that Ireland is facing a major problem with obesity sport could and should be a highly cost effective and sustainable public health intervention.

As we have said many times in the past SPORT MATTERS. It is good for the economy; it enhances our image abroad; It has the potential to improve health; and in these difficult times it is one of the few areas that lights up the day and makes up feel better about ourselves and our future.

As I hope you will see in our annual report Irish sport is in a relatively healthy state. To remain there it does however require the government to engage more fully with it and to fully embrace its potential.

Generating a return on investment

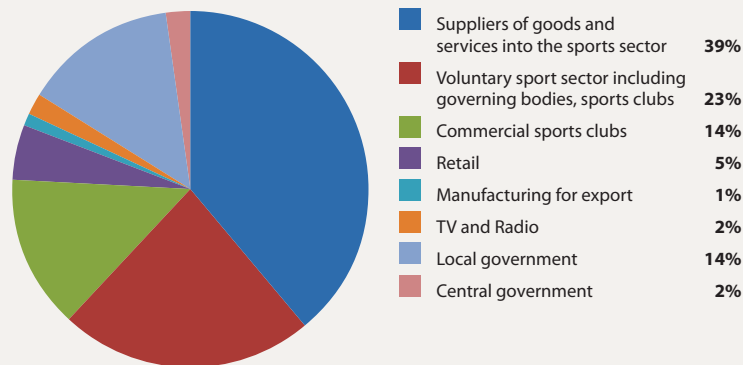
In straightened times such as those currently being faced by Ireland it is important that we all play our part to try a help create a better Ireland. Sport is keenly aware of this reality. Sport is however dependent on Government to assist in developing the environment in which to allow sport to flourish.

This is because the impact of sport stretches well beyond the white lines of any sports field or the walls of any sports facility. Sport is a contributor to Ireland's economy delivering a return on every euro invested. The sports industry globally is valued at \$114 billion and is growing. Its value is expected to reach \$133 billion by 2013.

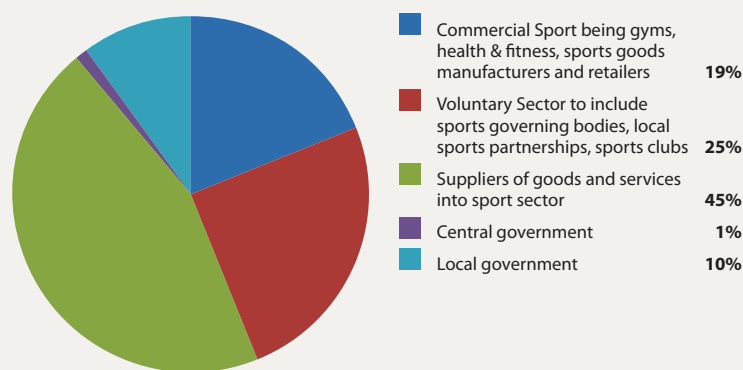
In Ireland sport has not traditionally been seen as an industry. This is perhaps because sport in Ireland is largely fuelled by a volunteer effort. The reality is however that it is a valuable contributor to the Irish economy.

Sports contribution to Ireland's economy is facilitated by a total government investment in 2011 of €86 million of which the €46.87 million distributed through the Irish Sports Council is the vital seed capital from which all else follows. A return to the Exchequer of €149 for every €100 invested.

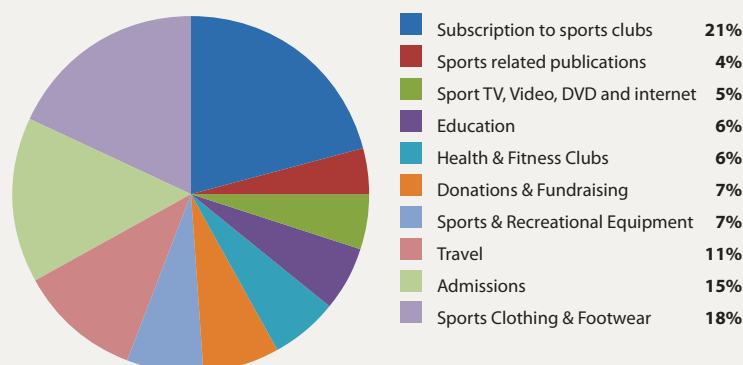
Sport and sport related spending supports in excess of 38,000 jobs equalling 2% of total Irish employment:



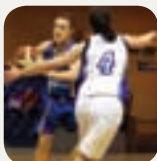
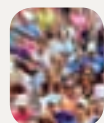
Sport contributes €1.8 billion to GDP made up of:



Sport and sport related spending stimulates €1.9 billion of household spending each year:

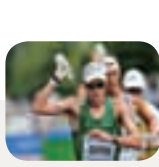

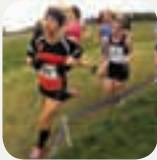

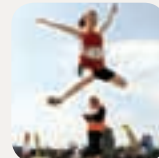

A more active Ireland is a healthier Ireland

The WHO provide that 6% of deaths globally are due to physical inactivity. In Australia it estimate that for every 1% of the population that becomes physically active 127 deaths from cardiovascular disease, diabetes and certain cancers can be avoided.

Obesity is becoming an increasing problem in Ireland with 1 in 5 Irish children and adults being obese. €400 million is spent each year on treating obesity. People who engage in moderate physical activity are 14 years younger in health terms than those who do nothing at all.

There are therefore significant short, medium & long term benefits to our public health system from getting more Irish people physically active more often. Irish Sport is looking to play its part...

- 367,000 children took part in more than 48,000 "Go Game Blitzes" run by the GAA
- FAI have implemented the Buntús Programme in over 1,500 primary schools in the Republic of Ireland in local sports partnership areas

Irish Sport something for everyone

While everyone enjoys basking in the successes of Irish Sport both at home and abroad, the foundation of all of Irish sport lies in the work carried out day in day out in every area of the country.

For every sportsman, sportswoman or team we celebrate for making it to the top there are literally hundreds of thousands of men, women and children enjoying the camaraderie, the craic and the challenges provided by sport at all levels throughout the country.

Just think, some 1,700,000 people on this island participate in active sport at some level across over 70 different sports week in week out every year. That they are enabled to do so is down to the innovative programs devised by sports' governing bodies, and the Local Sport's Partnerships, and delivered by the 270,000 volunteers that week in week out are there to give advice, prepare facilities and supervise training and games and thus ensure SPORT HAPPENS.

And it does happen in parks, in pools, on sea, on shore in proper sports grounds, in village halls and in a myriad of different locations.

Sport thrives in communities the length and breadth of the land – it binds communities and helps us all through the dark days.

For most boys and girls sport starts at primary school level where teachers first introduce them to the at least one sport. The next step is generally to join a local club where a wider range of skills are acquired. These are then supplemented at secondary level where new sports

are often introduced, then honed in one of the more than 12,000 sports clubs dotted across Ireland.

The seeds have been sown and hopefully nurtured. By now the truly talented will normally have been selected to join an academy or an elite programme.

For everyone else there are their own version of 'playing for Ireland', 'winning an All Ireland' or 'competing in the Olympic Games'.

What Junior soccer player does not covet winning their own league or cup, or better still winning an FAI Junior Cup medal?

What club GAA player does not dream of winning a county title or playing in an ALL Ireland Club final at Croke Park?

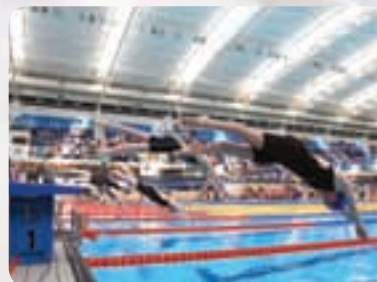
For rugby there is an AIL title or even an Irish cap playing for the club international side!

Every sport has its own Everest, and its more minor peaks to conquer. Everyone has their dream!

It is all part of the rich canvas of Irish sporting life. Sport also drives domestic tourism. In Canada it is estimated that 38% of domestic tourism is directly attributable to sport.

All of this adds to the revenues generated by sport at every single level never mind the huge contribution sport also makes to the health of the nation.

Sport allows people to dream. We need to give our sportspeople just like Ireland itself the opportunity to reach their full potential. Government investment in Irish Sport commenced in 1997. The high performance systems currently in place across our Olympic sports were put in place following the Athens Games in 2004. The results of that investment are now being seen with increased consistency in performance on the international stage across all sports.

One year out from the Beijing Olympics Irish athletes won 19 medals at all levels across all sports that figure for 2011 is 56...

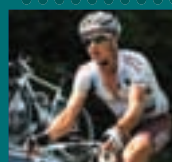
